His study invest gates how Axis propagandists paid close at ent on to developments in the borderlands region and frequently exploited regional concerns in their short-wave radio broadcasts to Lat n America as a means of undermining Pan-Americanism. During World War II, transnat onal drug smuggling became conf ated with Axis plots to subjugate America; Mexican braceros were no longer portrayed as unwanted aliens but rather hailed by U.S. government of cials and propagandists as heroic "soldiers of product on" in the bat le against global fascism; and the Zoot Suit culture of Mexican

American barrio youth became a symbol of disloyalty. Romo is the author of

(Cinco Puntos Press, 2001). In the book, Romo documented the central role played by El Paso and Juárez in helping to spark the Mexican Revolut on. During the 1930s and 1940s, these and other cit es along the border would again play an important, but lit le studied, role in the polit cal transformat on of Mexico.
