# Mid-Term Progress Reports (MPRs) completed at an all-time high this semester

This semester we had a record-setting 80.3% of faculty report mid-term grades, with over 90% of Dedman College of Humanities and Sciences and Lyle School of Engineering faculty making submissions. Submitting MPRs is a crucial step in the SMU in Four initiative, as it allows records offices, advisors, and academic support staff to identify and support students who may need additional help in certain academic areas. Staff will now reach out to students with two or more reported deficiencies and invite them to discuss academic support options, such as peer tutoring and meeting with their professors, that can help boost their academic performance.

## Master's in Data Science Program hosted its eighteenth Immersion and Capstone Symposium this past March

Last month, the Master's of Science in Data Science (MSDS) Program hosted its 18th Immersion and Capstone Symposium. The event brought together students, faculty, and Data Science Advisory representatives from the business community, who evaluated 10 capstone presentations. The presentations covered diverse research topics, including enhancing lower limb prostheses functionality through machine learning, modeling U.S. Supreme Court cases using natural language processing, and optimizing university fundraising.

The symposium also featured Rameez MeeraSahib, Global CTO & Head of Data Analytics, Artificial Intelligence and Internet of Things Products and Solutions at Micro Focus, as a guest speaker. Attendees participated in a panel discussion exploring the implications of ChatGPT. The Immersion and Capstone Symposium is held each semester, with the next symposium planned for mid-July.

## Bridwell Library to host the Codex Sassoon, the earliest most complete known Hebrew Bible

The <u>Codex Sasson</u>, a Hebrew Bible approximately 1,100 years old, is scheduled to be exhibited at the Bridwell Library April 18-20. The Codex is the earliest and most complete Hebrew Bible extant and provides the basis of biblical translations used today by Jews and Christians. Admission is free and open to the public, but tickets are required. Register for <u>tickets here</u>.

After the Bridwell showing, the holy book will be sent to auction at Sotheby's in New York. The exhibition marks the first public appearance of the Bible in the United States, following recent exhibitions in London and Tel Aviv.
